

Pastor's Annual Report

The psalmist once asked, “*What shall I return to the Lord for all his goodness to me?*” When I look back over 2025, my heart echoes that question. God has been faithful to our congregation and, in ways both seen and unseen, has poured out blessings. In response we lift up the cup of salvation, call on the name of the Lord and keep the vows we have made in the presence of God’s people. This report is offered in that spirit of thanksgiving.

A Year of Grace and Growth

Looking back over the last twelve months I am overwhelmed by the love, unity and joy that marked our life together. Our church family showed up in so many ways: at Sunday worship, at special events, behind the scenes and in the quiet spaces of prayer. New friends began worshipping with us, some moved toward membership and two candidates followed Christ in the waters of baptism. We celebrated *new life* and *new commitments* even as we mourned the passing of beloved saints.

Highlights from 2025

- **Vibrant Worship and Creative Outreach** – Our church’s social ministry reminded us that fellowship around the table is holy work. Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter services were well attended, and our congregation once again partnered with five other local churches for a Sunrise Service at McCook’s Point. We had a wonderful summer celebration with a Christian “Magician”. Our “Back-to-Church” celebration took place in September, and the youth group organized a pancake breakfast that day to launch our fall schedule.
- **Vacation Bible School and RadiantTide** – For the first time in many years we hosted a three-day Vacation Bible School. Children learned that they are “Growing with Jesus” and even worked alongside volunteers in the Giving Garden. In September, our children’s Sunday school program was officially rebranded and named RadiantTide. This ministry aims at grounding young hearts in the gospel and sending them out as beacons of Christ’s love. One of the main objectives of this program is to expand our Christian education efforts and bring new families into our building.
- **Youth-Led Events** – Our young people shone this year. They raised funds through grinder sales, hosted a *Talent Show* and a *Magic Show*, and helped prepare lunch at our spring and fall sales. Their creativity and enthusiasm were infectious. Proceeds from those events helped support youth ministry and our new contemporary service. We are thankful for Cailyn Anger and Keren Alexandre’s contribution to this ministry.
- **Congregational Events** – We continued to hold events that members of our community have enjoyed for years. For example, we had the annual St. Patrick’s potluck, a church picnic at McCook’s Point Park, a Halloween party and potluck, a spring and year-end sale, the annual wreath-making, etc.
- **Musical Events** – As usual, our sanctuary rang with beautiful music during our services, and special music during the summer. A wonderful classical Christmas concert in December featured Teresa Eickel, David Marotollo, Jane Murray and Susan Skogerboe, and drew a full house. We are proud to say that we had another Christmas concert on our Saturday afternoon service headlined by Donna Currier, Naelle, Jena and Nayla Guerrier. We also had a Christmas musical, “Signs of Christmas,” which featured our choir and the RadiantTide children under the leadership of Linda Sutherland. Services and concerts were live-streamed thanks to our dedicated audio-visual team, extending our ministry to those at home.
- **The EverPlace** – In October we launched *The EverPlace*, a contemporary worship experience on Saturday afternoons. This new ministry features modern worship music and relaxed liturgy. Members of our team purchased audio and video equipment and prepared the space so that the inaugural service on 25 October could be streamed effectively. Attendance has been steady, with visitors who might not come to a traditional Sunday service finding a spiritual home here. I am deeply grateful to those who provide hospitality, music and technical support each week. The EverPlace is already touching lives and I urge everyone to continue supporting this ministry with your presence and through the invitation of friends and families.
- **Mission and Service** – Once again, the Giving Garden grew foods to serve local food banks. Care & Share’s spring, Thanksgiving and Christmas drives filled boxes with pantry items, and delivered Easter baskets to

several families. Our congregation also supported the needy in the larger community of East Lyme through the Community Circle's outreach. These acts of generosity are evidence of Christ's love flowing through us.

- **Facility Stewardship** – Our Trustees oversaw major projects such as a new roof on the sanctuary and Sunday School building as well as other important repair projects. Many members participated in spring and fall clean-up days. I personally thank everyone who has worked hard to keep our building safe.
- **Digital Outreach** – Our online footprint has grown in 2025. Many thanks to Mike Meinz who worked hard to improve our Internet connectivity after our church decided to have its own Internet. We also thank volunteers such as Penny Smyth, David Watson, Brian Burrige, Debbie, Andy and Sean Blankenship for working to improve our video ministry under Mike's leadership.

Pastoral Objectives and Progress

Last year, I outlined my pastoral objectives, drawing inspiration from Psalm 116 and our church's mission. In 2025 those objectives remained my compass, and I would like to reflect briefly on them:

1. **Love our congregation with the love of Christ and offer wise, steady leadership** – I continued to prioritize pastoral care, visiting the sick, reaching out to shut-ins and walking with families through grief. Let us continue to pray for the families of our members who went back home to the Lord in 2025. We also had new births at our church. Everything we did together last year has deepened my love for our congregation and my strong desire to serve Christ.
2. **Work for the edification of members and regular attendees** – RadiantTide, Vacation Bible School and youth events provided new opportunities for spiritual growth. The launch of The EverPlace has expanded our spiritual offer to our community. Every Saturday, our worship team, with Lead Singer Ange Marie Guerrier, introduced new music to broaden our worship vocabulary. Simultaneously, we have retained the beautiful tenets of our Sunday morning service that our congregants have valued for years.
3. **Engage our town and wider community** – I have participated in various community events. I have sought the advice of Council members on the best ways to be more involved in the community. The EverPlace specifically targets unchurched and de-churched individuals who might feel hesitant about Sunday worship. We also strengthened ties with other congregations by co-hosting the sunrise service, hosting a clergy luncheon and collaborating with Boy Scouts and local businesses. I also lead a church service at two different nursing homes every month. I thank Linda Lemanski for being my faithful companion and friend in this critical ministry.
4. **Engage our denomination and region** – Last year, I became the Moderator of SUNL, which is an Association of nearly 20 American Baptist Churches in this part of the state. I plan to continue to hold that position for the foreseeable future. In fact, with the help of a grant from SUNL our youth ministry received significant funding for The EverPlace. My dream is to encourage our churches to collaborate more effectively to win more souls for Christ. Our relationship with American Baptist Churches of Connecticut deepened through joint events and communication.
5. **Lead the strategic planning process** – In last year's report I challenged us to resurrect the church Council and begin long-range planning. I am pleased to report that in 2025 we formed a Church Council composed of representatives of various church ministries. We also formed a Strategic Planning Committee as well as several Sub-Committees. Together we are discerning God's direction for the next five to ten years. Our early meetings have focused on listening – to Scripture, to demographic data about the decline of churches across America, and most importantly to each other. The team plans to bring concrete proposals to the congregation in 2026, but for now I ask you to pray for wisdom and to share your hopes and concerns. It takes all of us to envision the future God has for Flanders Baptist & Community Church.

Gratitude for Faithful Service

Every ministry at FBCC relies on faithful volunteers. I cannot possibly name everyone, but I want to offer heartfelt thanks:

- **Boards, Committees, Communication and Finance** – Our deacons continued to provide worship leadership, prepare the communion table, visit members and assist at funerals. We are especially grateful to Ted and

Jan Richmond, who concluded their term in 2026. We also thank Matt and Kim who have decided not to renew their term as Trustees. We have a vibrant church because of the work of all volunteers and all members of our community. Special thanks to the Community Circle, Stitches of Faith, Kitchen Committee, Sunday school, the music ministry, ushers, greeters, worship assistants, etc. You all played indispensable roles. I am also grateful to Linda, Mike and Maggie Watson for making our newsletter available to our community every month. I am grateful to Beth Richmond for doing an amazing job as our Church Treasurer.

- **Congregation & Friends** – Thank you to every member, attender and friend of FBCC. Whether you have been here for decades or joined us recently, your presence matters. Thank you for making casseroles, donating goods, singing in the choir, teaching children, shoveling snow, sending cards, praying, giving financially and inviting friends. Thank you to our sick and shut-ins who pray for us from home and remind us of the broader communion of saints. Thank you to the new members who joined in 2025 and to the many visitors who have begun to call this place home.

Looking Forward

The challenges facing the wider church are real. Fewer people belong to congregations and many buildings sit empty. Yet I believe, with the apostle Paul, that “*God is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us*” (Ephesians 3:20). The growth in cumulative attendance (Sunday and Saturday), giving and ministry this year convinces me that the Holy Spirit is at work among us. New initiatives like RadiantTide and The EverPlace, along with deeper strategic planning, demonstrate our willingness to adapt while remaining rooted in the gospel and respectful of our traditions.

As we move into 2026, let us recommit to our calling: to love God with all our hearts and to love our neighbors as ourselves. Let us continue to welcome newcomers, care for the vulnerable, invest in our children and youth, and dream big dreams. Together we can say, “*with God, the best is yet to come.*”

Thank you for another blessed year. May the Lord bless you and keep you, make his face to shine upon you and give you peace.

Pastor Emeritus Annual Report

The Giving Garden harvested 11,380 lbs. of vegetables, which were distributed to the poor through Gemma Moran. Many thanks to the volunteers who have made this possible.

As I sat down to write about Kim Maynard, it occurred to me that many in church would not remember her. I have forgotten how long now her health problems prevented her from attending, but it must have been at least 25 years. There was a time in the 1990's when she was one of those who came to every service, Bible Study, and supper here. In later years I used to bring her communion at Twin Haven. In the face of real trials with her health, she was a woman of great faith.

At the time I write these words there has not yet been a public service for Bill Kerr, but he did a lot for this town. After many years in the police department, he switched over to fire services and was chief at Flanders for about 20 years, the longest serving chief in that department's history. It was Bill who made my father the firehouse chaplain, a job that I later inherited. Bill attended services every week almost without exception.

Nancy Waido was the volunteer firefighter of the year for many years, meaning she answered more calls than any other volunteer. She attended only once in a while but was exceptionally good to many in church who used the ambulance. Over the years there has often been a bad pothole at the corner of Willett's and Ocean Avenue in New London. Kim Maynard (who lived with severe bone pain) told me how carefully Nancy would take that turn on the way to L&M, and how much she appreciated it.

Using a walker, Louise Wallace regularly attended services and Community Circle meetings. She appreciated the warmth and friendship of this congregation; Joanne Jackson was particularly good to her, and I remember deacons like Ted Richmond and John Eberle helping Louise in and out of the church. Susan Bindloss was also a regular here at church services, coming for years with her friend Judy Pope. Despite years of poor health, Nancy Wood was always full of good cheer. She attended both Flanders and Grassy Hill; I began preaching in Grassy Hill in the summer of 1992 after a conversation with Nancy & Ed Wood and Lily Mae Rood. Myrna Lindstrom helped at sales and at gatherings after funerals for many years and was a regular at our old Wednesday night service. I always felt a special debt to people who taught Sunday School, and Liz French was one of them.

Who was like Marge Ferencz? At the time of her passing she was our second oldest member (after Mary Lou Johnson), and the only one who had been attending at Flanders since before WWII. She worked hard at sales, suppers, and gatherings after funerals, and was active in various knitting groups and dancing clubs. A lot must get done in heaven if Marge is there.

Community Circle

Introduction

Our Mission and Service

Throughout the past 100 years, the Community Circle has been committed to providing Christian fellowship and community outreach. We have organized fundraisers to support both our church and the wider community. Events and Outreach

A great Thank you to all those who helped to pack the food and load the cars!!!



The "Stitches of Faith" ministry had a productive year. We met monthly (except for July-August) to share ideas for projects, , make plans for sales, and enjoy a time of fellowship and knitting/crocheting. Our group took part in the May 2025 church sale as well as the November 2025 holiday sale.



In October, Liz Beals provided a presentation during church to explain the history behind the prayer shawl ministry. We had several of our hand-crafted items on display for the congregation. Web, Social Media & Video

During 2025, there were 2,391 website visitors with 6,093 sessions and a total of 23,345 page views. A total of 26 emails were received via the website Contact form. The church calendar, published as a PDF on the website, was revised several times. The church directory, published as a PDF on the website, was re-published to reflect requested changes.

The facebook.com/FlandersBaptist Facebook page had 288 Followers at the beginning of 2025 and 321 Followers at the end of 2025, an 11.4% increase. There was an increase in postings and followers on the Facebook page thanks to Rev. Guerrier posting many photographs with comments and purchasing ads to increase potential viewers.

Services and concerts were live streamed and recorded thanks to Penny Smyth, David Watson, and Andy, Deb and Sean Blankenship. At the end of 2025, Brian Burrridge volunteered to participate as a Video Volunteer and the Blankenship's suspended their participation.

Prior to the October 25th *The Everplace* inaugural Saturday service, additional audio/video equipment was purchased. The new equipment included a PC, a monitor, a projector, microphone stand and adapter, HDMI cables, an HDMI splitter, a BlueTooth sound device and a small table.

In October, we ended our use of the Giving Garden's Internet connection and began using Frontier Fiber 500Mbps service. Immediately we saw an improvement, Then, in early November we started having intermittent outages. Frontier diagnosed the problem as a faulty Optical Network Terminal (ONT) and replaced the month-old ONT with a newer model. Since then, our Internet has been working well. We have had occasional issues where our live stream has been interrupted. Follow-up research on those issues convinced us that the problem was not with our Internet connection but was somewhere between our connection and YouTube which is out of our control.

During 2025, we live streamed and published 85 church services/events.
